I couldn't think of anything to fill this page and then remembered our big move. Here's a picture to see the progress.

As you enter the barn from the new south doors and to the right will be a welcoming area and elevator to the second floor. To the left will be our small office and next to that are the new restrooms. Continuing on will be the display area. On the left wall will be our fire and police display and the antique fire truck. The rest of the first floor will be farm implements, buggies and various display items that belong in a barn.

At the back will be another stairway leading to the second floor. At the top of the stairs by the huge north windows we hope to have the Nicholson table and chairs so we can be looking at the pond while relaxing there.

We plan to have Mayor Olson's desk, conference table and political display on the east side of the room. In the back near the elevator will be a separate room marked office but it will really be a workroom and storage. Continuing around the main floor space will be many of our current displays but with some changes. We don't know yet what will fit where and plan to get measuring the space as soon as the workers are done.

The walls will be covered with wood sheets instead of drywall and a beautiful wood floor will be installed on the second floor. The main floor will stay concrete.

We are thinking of closing the museum for a few weeks in order to get everything moved and set up. The day of the move we need volunteers to help get boxes and displays to their proper spot in the barn. In the first floor we will need volunteers to help with cleaning and dusting everything before it is brought into the museum. We want everything to look it's best before going on display.

We would like to feed all our volunteers so if you can't physically help with the move but want to be involved we would appreciate snacks and desserts for the volunteers.


Meanwhile if you'd like to visit the current museum before it all changes we are here Friday mornings and Saturday and Sunday 1– 4 pm.

Emeritus Professor of History at IU Northwest, co-director of the Calumet Regional Archives, editor of Steel Shavings magazine, and author of several books on Gary and Northwest Indiana.

Professor Lane born in Easton, PA, attended Bucknell University (BA), the University of Hawaii (MA) and the University of Maryland (PhD. He taught American History at IU Northwest for 37 years, starting in 1970. He has written volumes on Gary, Cedar Lake, and Portage and a frequent contributor to "Traces" magazine and is on the editorial board of "Indiana Magazine of History."
